

**Professor Daniella Tilbury** is a senior manager with responsibility for leadership and learning for sustainability across the University of Gloucestershire. In her role as a University Director she leads the implementation of the University's Sustainability Strategy 'Promising Futures' and oversees the International Research Institute in Sustainability (IRIS) and the United Nation University accredited Regional Centre of Expertise (RCE) in Education for Sustainable Development (ESD).

Daniella has had a lengthy research career with a focus on leadership, learning and institutional change for sustainability. She commenced her doctoral studies at the University of Cambridge in 1990 and completed within three years. Her PhD research was the first to look at institutional and development for sustainability within higher education. Since then she has been the recipient of several research awards including the Macquarie Innovation Award for Research (Australia 2007) and the Marie Curie Research Fellowship (European Commission 2009). She was the winner of the 2010 Green Gown Award (UK) for her institutional change in ESD work. Daniella was the Founding Director of the Australian Research Institute in Education for Sustainability (ARIES) established by the Australian Government.

Daniella is Co-Chair of the Sustainable Futures Leadership Academy for Higher Education and a Foundation Fellow of the Leadership Trust. She chairs the UN Global Monitoring and Evaluation Expert Group which advises on the assessment of global progress during the UN Decade in ESD. She led the UNESCO-IUCN Asia Pacific ESD Indicators Project and is the UK government nominated member of the UNECE Expert Group on ESD Competences.

Daniella has over 100 publications. Recent publications include 'Education for Sustainable Development: An Expert Review'(UNESCO 2011) and 'Higher Education for Sustainability: A Global Overview of Commitment and Progress' (GUNI 2011). She has given keynote addresses in conferences across the globe, including the UN World Conference in ESD (Bonn 2009) and UNESCO's side event at the World Summit on Sustainable Development (Johannesburg 2002). Her early work focused on monitoring and evaluation of sustainability frameworks. She has assessed strategic initiatives for government agencies; conducted participatory evaluations for EU programmes and evaluated field projects in Tanzania, Madagascar, South Africa, Venezuela, Brazil, Colombia, China, Hungary, Vietnam, Australia, Spain, Tunisia and Italy.
